

It is no wonder that Dewey's ideas and actions appeal to us in a moment when the duty to think and the task to educate are more threatened than ever. John Dewey was an intellectual who overcame barriers among disciplines and who assumed, unlike many other humanists, the challenges of the 20th Century.

Although he inherited values of the European tradition, his unique perspective had its roots in an all-American substratum. Dewey experienced diverse political and social situations between 1859 and 1952, not only in the United States, but all around the world. Since then, world-historical events and new forms of global life demand a full reconsideration of his outstanding legacy.

Rethinking Democracy gets together, for the first time, a group of renowned Spanish scholars on Dewey, with the purpose of reexamining the current relevance of his ideas on democracy, ethics, techno-science, education, and religion. The event has also international guests from the United States, México, and Italy.

This symposium is the first activity supported by CEDE (*Centro de Estudios Dewey en España*) a new space for research and debate that will be inaugurated in Alcalá de Henarés University thanks to the support of *Dewey Center* at Illinois, *Franklin Institute*, and the collaboration of a committee of experts from Spanish Universities.

Centro de Estudios Dewey en España will make available for graduate and post-graduate students and scholars from diverse fields Dewey's complete works and correspondence, as well as resources on secondary bibliography, both in Spanish and English.

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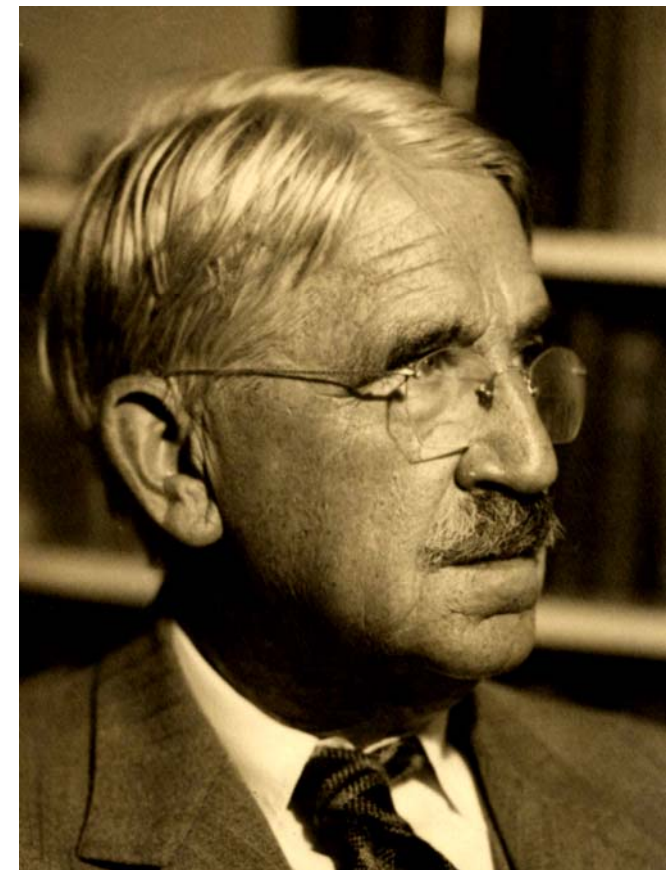
