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ONE, PROLEGOMENA, 1910-1919 (pp. 1-11)

First visit to Castle Howard; the courting of Rosalind Murray; Tony and Philip as Children; World War I begins; the Peace Conference; postwar depression; doubts about the Koraeas Chair.

TWO, 1937-1939 (pp. 12-47)

Columba Cary-Elwes, O.S.B., then thirty-three, and Arnold J. Toynbee, forty-seven, have met at Ampleforth, where Lawrence, A.J.T.'s youngest son, is a student; the letters commence and increase in ease as the friendship grows; A.J.T.'s pivotal statement of his religious position; Tony's death: «from now on, I should be dealing about Tony with God»; Rosalind's Good Pagan's Failure; the civil war in Spain; the coming world war; A.J.T. goes to Oxford to direct intelligence services; the first air raids; A Catholic country house.

THREE, 1940-1942 (pp. 48-129)

A.J.T.'s forebodings during the brooding early months of the war; peaceful Yorkshire; the invasion of France: «The tide is full against us now»; Dunkerque; the moral collapse of France; critique of Pétain; a glimpse of Hilaire Belloc; the Battle of Britain; London in wartime; A.J.T.'s difficulties with his colleagues; the church «a pure stream in a muddy ditch»; contrasting attitudes to Russia, now in the war; Lawrence in the Coldstream Guards; A.J.T. flown by Clipper to the United States, «a middle-class terrestrial paradise».

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
